









MULTICULTURAL ESPOO AND OMNIA

- The aim of the City of Espoo is to raise the level of education in multicultural education and to facilitate integration and employment.
- Of Omnia's 7,000 undergraduate students,
 28.4% are currently non-native Finnish speakers
- Working life is in transition.
- Omnia's students represent more than hundred different nationalities.



MULTICULTURAL COMMUNICATION

- We need cultural knowledge
- Discretion, sensitivity
- Verbal communication only 7%, non-verbal 93 %
 - ✓ rhetoric, eye contact, touhing, reserved, authority,
 - ✓ dressing, eating, interaction
 - ✓ religion



THE MOST COMMON CAUSES OF CONFLICTS IN MULTICULTURAL WORKPLACES

- Attitude to the time, hectic deadlines, contracts.
- Attitude to the purpose of the job and job discriptions.
- Uderstanding of laws and regulations.
- Attitude to power authority and control.
- Tolerance of uncertainty and self-iniative.
- Participation in brainstorming, meetings, decision making.
- Individualy/community, competition.
- Differences in language skills.
- Cultural differences in interaction and communication.




HOW CAN WE SUPPORT AND GUIDE MULTICULTURAL STUDENTS? 10 TIPS

- 1. Listen what the student wants to say
- 2. Give time, slow down
- 3. Use ordinary and concrete words
- 4. Use easy language structure and short sentences
- 5. Talk natural way and acsent ©




HOW CAN WE SUPPORT AND GUIDE MULTICULTURAL STUDENTS?

- 6. Stay calm even if you dont'understand and say if you dont'understund
- 7. Ask if you can correct the language mistakes
- 8. Correct the misunderstandings
- 9. Draw, write, act, use bodylanguage
- 10. Use the Easy-to-read-material if possible




EASY-TO-READ LANGUAGE

- Easy-to-read Finnish (selkokieli) is easier to understand than standard Finnish.
- Easy-to-read Finnish is a form of Finnish where the language has been adapted so that it is easier to read and understand in terms of content, vocabulary and structure.
- It is targeted at people who have difficulties with reading or understanding standard language.
- Easy-to-read language is accessible language.




EASY-TO-READ-LANGUAGE

- Easy-to-read language benefits people with inadequate language skills, increasing their opportunities to cope with situations in everyday life, studies and working life and to participate in society.
- The need for easy-to-read language can be connected to:
- 1. neurobiological causes (e.g. developmental disability, dysphasia, dyslexia, ADHD or other similar conditions)
- 2. reduced language skills (e.g. memory disorders, aphasia, dementia)
- 3. using Finnish or Swedish as a second or foreign language.

- Help students during on-the-joblearning (social and health care department)










POSITIVE GUIDENCE
